

## Principal's Report



2022 will be remembered as the year Seaview returned well and truly back on the map.

The introduction of Year 7s to high school saw student enrolments rise to 1300 accompanied by 51 new leaders, teachers and support staff who joined our team.

Compounding this was our extensive building development plus a staggered start with online learning for over half of the school!

It can't be denied this all made for a challenging start – and one complicated further by the third year of living with Covid-19.

Closures were a reality, followed by vaccine and mask mandates and a plethora of absences due to illness – but we navigated these trials and, as the world around us slowly settled, we actively sought ways to re-connect and re-establish the community we value so highly.

Our Seaview Plus clubs have been integral to this process; as has the array of Year Level and Pastoral Care activities, Knock Out and Zone Sports, Pedal Prix and Performing Arts events.

We take every opportunity we can to celebrate the participation and achievement of our students – I encourage you to like us on Facebook if you haven't already done so; however, you will catch a glimpse of the abundance of activity on offer within the pages of the 2022 Yearbook.

Particular highlights for me this year include the extraordinary levels of student participation in our whole school celebrations. Ranging from The International Day of Happiness to Wear it Purple Day - these occasions highlight the indisputable value we place on equity and inclusion as a school.





### Principal's Report

As always, I thank our staff for their tireless commitment to delivering such an abundance of opportunities to develop our students into the best version of themselves.

One very special occasion, which allowed us to showcase our amazing school was welcoming our new Minister for Education and Training, the Honourable Blair Boyer, along with several other dignitaries to the official opening of our beautiful, new Performing Arts and Creative Design Buildings.

Seaview High School has a long, proud history as a performing arts school and these state of the art facilities are testament to how much we value the Creative Arts.

At the same time we acknowledged that the initial building development, way back in 2014, began as a STEM & Advanced Technology initiative to promote science, technology, engineering and mathematics subjects to increase the range of pathways for young people into STEM-related training and future careers.

In 2014 we were a comparatively small school, of under 500 students; and this STEM Grant in many ways, started the renaissance of our school and our ongoing commitment to ensuring teaching and learning theory influenced the design of our buildings to enhance learning activities and student outcomes.

The initial funding delivered our Maker Space, the STEM/Science wing and Digital Production suite. In 2017, just as we finished this build we received a further \$3 million for STEM WORKS, resulting in the Learning Hub, Food Science & Food technology spaces being developed.

Our increasing student population had access to a future focused curriculum, we introduced new subjects all delivered in state of the art facilities - students loved them and they excelled!

In 2020 we were privileged to receive a further \$16.5 million to support our rapidly expanding school.

I would like to acknowledge the expertise of the many staff, students and families who contributed enthusiastically to each development.

I thank our governments, past and present for the funding – for the architects and capital works team, past and present for their guidance and support and Tracey Aberle, Business Leader extraordinaire, for her insight, passion, tenacity, energy and unswerving commitment to providing the best of the best for students at Seaview High School.

Next year, we look forward to a more settled start with a few minor upgrades, an almost complete staff and a single intake of students.

With an enrolment of over 1300 students we can no longer be considered a small school; however, we remain deeply committed to our school values – Respect, Empathy, Integrity and Resilience and ensuring our students continue to be at the centre of everything we do!

### SRC President's Report

SRC's first event was the celebration of International Day of Happiness on 20 March 2022.

This was celebrated through a 'Monday Funday' activity which involved students being welcomed into the Learning Hub to play a range of board games, colour in mandalas and listen to calming, meditative music. Throughout the day, the SRC sold out of all drinks, sausages and egg and bacon rolls, eventually raising \$500.

In Term 2 we recognised NAIDOC week through a Covid-friendly live-stream whole school assembly. The assembly portrayed some of Seaview's great talent, whilst also connecting to the theme of "Get up! Stand up! Show up!"

The assembly included a commemorative dance, didgeridoo performance, music, and messages from staff and SRC members on the importance of reconciliation, recognition, and celebration of Aboriginal culture.

### NAIDOC / Reconciliation Week

Seaview High School is proud to be situated on Kaurna Land.

At Seaview, we celebrated both NAIDOC Week and National Reconciliation Week this year.

NAIDOC Week is a time for reflection and celebration of the sovereignty, histories, cultures, and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

We celebrated NAIDOC Week with a Staff vs Student AFL match – the students took the win!

We were also lucky enough to have the Southern Basket Weavers come and share the art and history of weaving with some of our classes.

Reconciliation Week is a time of looking at both history and future to explore how all people can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia.

For Reconciliation Week, we shared informational posts about significant achievements of Reconciliation efforts in Australia.

Our Care Group classes also looked at videos and media releases that highlighted the need for, and importance of, Reconciliation.

These events and activities provided students with opportunities to connect with important aspects of Aboriginal culture.

To further our efforts in providing a culturally safe and thriving community at Seaview, we started the process of creating a Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).

To provide our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students, families, and staff with a more inclusive environment, we began by forming a team of staff to head up the RAP.

We then collaborated with our wider staff community to gain broader perspective and understanding to guide our Vision Statement.

We met with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to hear from them about their individual and collective experiences at Seaview.

We also started focusing on re-strengthening our relationships with families, local services, and community Elders to help foster cultural connections with our school community – something the Covid pandemic limited us in doing.



### Media Art Report

The Year 12s explored the use of FX makeup and chroma-keying to create special effects including hands reaching out of laptop screens, and wounds.




















### Performing Arts - Dance

### Food & Hospitality Report

A large part of SACE Food and Hospitality is to cater events throughout the school.

This year there were multiple events amongst the Year 11s and Year 12s. One of these was the grand opening of the new Performing Arts and Creative Design buildings.

Experiencing a Year 7 SIS cohort for the first time re-jigged many of the Statewide Schools Competition age levels and this definitely favoured the Seaview High School results in these competitions significantly.

For the 6th year running, students involved in Southern Zone Sport competitions and Statewide Schools competitions significantly increased, with the SIS members heavily contributing to this.

The 2021 Howard Mutton Shield results placed Seaview in 12th position in SA, an excellent result after finishing 7th in 2020 and considering Seaview High School only enters competitions in the 6 SIS sports.







**Operation Flinders Report** 

We departed Seaview High School at 5am on Tuesday 23 August 2022. In total we had seven students attend after some last minute changes.

Mark Koen (Youth Worker), Cameron Sparkes (Teacher), Marco (Team Leader) and Naomi (Assistant Team Leader) were the adults supervising the operation.

After the approximate 8 hour bus ride up to Yankaninna Station – Marco and Naomi took over and ran the operations and logistics for our team for the duration of the program.

On the first day upon arrival, some boys were very quiet and struggled with the initial walk with their rucksacks, others were pretty up and about.

We initially struggled with the prickles, setting up their tents (hoochies/tarps), packing rucksacks and taking on different roles (eg cook, dish washer, captain, toilet monitor, etc). Over time the boys improved significantly with their "bushcraft".


Each day we walked around 10-15kms across tough and rugged terrain. Over the week we managed to climb up 3 different peaks, one of the biggest being Mount Rose (just shy of +1,000m).

Abseiling was a big highlight for the boys, they also had the chance to climb up on a cabled ladder system which they enjoyed. Many of the boys broke through a range of fears on this day and I very much enjoyed taking photos of the boys from the top.

As the trip progressed, the boys started to become more comfortable with one another and the experience of bushwalking and bush camping being "the norm".







#### **Operation Flinders Report**

Some of our conversations were really meaningful around the campfire in particular and some students opened up in ways in which I haven't seen them do so back at school.

Sharing food was something that was very much a work in progress throughout the trip, as it was much scarcer than back in normal Adelaide life. Literally all of our food was shared between our team of 11 (including the adults) which was certainly a challenge for all involved.

By the last day, we had trekked through around 100kms and had some truly fantastic experiences. The boys had mixed emotions about finishing and many teared up at the final presentations.

They had made a really strong connection with our team leader Marco and assistant team leader Naomi and were sad to say goodbye.

Cooper and Luke were presented with special awards for their leadership and progress made through the trip. Every boy was awarded with a set of "dog tags" for finishing the program.

On the last night we were all rewarded with a BBQ that we could cook over the fire, which was very well received after eating a lot of canned meals. I enjoyed shouting the boys something from the bakery on the return home as it had genuinely been a fantastic experience for all involved. Personally, I had high expectations of this trip and they were very much exceeded from this experience. They boys learnt so much and all 7 of them were pushed out of their comfort zone at different points along the trip.

The Operation Flinders staff spoke very highly of our team and even had some of the foundations major sponsors come out and talk to our boys on the final day.

Each boy had a different experience, but a positive one overall. I truly believe they all made significant steps towards becoming young men. Being away from their technology and phones for a week was priceless and allowed them to talk freely without the social pressures they face in their normal lives.

#### **Science Report**

Science at Seaview High School has continued to evolve in 2022 with an increase in students learning Science in Years 7-12.

This year we have continued our focus on a student-centered approach, rich with hands-on activities, practical investigations, group challenges and the use of an integrated Science Problem Based Learning (PBL) approach in all Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 classes.

Classes in the middle-school embraced the opportunities provided by our every growing STEM and Laboratory spaces, which includes a Food Science Laboratory, 4x wet laboratories and 5x large open plan STEM rooms.

Students had the opportunity to rotate through all these spaces throughout the year, while building on their scientific knowledge and practical skills.

Seaview High School has a highly successful Senior Science program, with strong numbers enrolled in SACE Science Subjects and high levels of achievement at Stage 1 and Stage 2.

In 2022, we saw a further increase in student numbers in all Senior Science subjects including Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Nutrition and Psychology. This success is not only due to the hard work and dedication of the senior school students and teachers, but the solid foundation built during middle-school Science.

National Science week had the theme of 'glass' this year and this was explored by involving students in a variety of care group challenges and a range of hands-on lunchtime activities throughout the week.

These activities consisted of a Staff Vs Students Marble run STEM challenge, meeting and feeding Seaview's animals and creating edible glass in the Food Science Laboratory.

The huge participation levels during National Science week highlighted how interested and inquisitive the Seaview High School students are in Science and the world around us.

#### Design / Technology Report

2022 was a challenging yet productive year in Design Technology.

We started the year with initial access to our new Creative Design building which is an amazing new space for both the Arts and Design Technology, and this has substantially expanded our capabilities and ability to cater for our growth in student numbers.

Pedal Prix and Automotive Tech shared a new multi-purpose workshop. Our Product Design courses have enjoyed a new Computer Aided Design suite, along with a new metal engineering workshop and a multipurpose workshop.

Though the spaces have taken most of the year to get fully functioning, students have been able to expand their projects and skills as more equipment has become available.

This year we started the Tech Club, a lunch time club for students looking for a time and place to meet others and build things in the workshop.





With great support from our valued staff, this quickly grew from a small group, to requiring more sessions per week, and then applications, as it has been bursting at the seams!

Projects completed this year have included a rolling bookshelf for a local primary school and a spice rack for Food Tech.

Student feedback has been that they feel more connected with the school, and their interests through such programs.

We've experienced growth in students enrolling in Creative Design Technologies and courses have seen many excellent projects and high student achievement. Problem-based learning activities have challenged students' critical and creative thinking and helped build their entrepreneurial skills.

Year 7 students undertook a textile project working with a local primary school to sew some soft toys for reception students.

Year 9 and 10 Creative Design classes engaged in some jewellery making including pewter casting, and copper work, and also making small leather products.



### Design / Technology Report

Our large cohort of Year 12 Product Engineering students focused their learning this year on timber solutions.

We also had 2 large classes of Year 12 Photography and Food and Hospitality, with some outstanding achievements across the year.

In term 3 we facilitated a tour of the new Shipbuilding yards at Osborne to see the first of the Hunter Class frigates, and have also been working with the aerospace industry to grow opportunities for our students and connect their classroom and workshop learning with the outside world.


